CHAPLAIN'S LETTER




This month's Chaplain's Letter was written by the Rev. Sam van Leer, Groningen Chaplain

In the forty days before Easter, we remember when Jesus, just after his baptism, was driven by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness, to fast and to pray, but also to be subjected to temptation by the devil. Jesus resisted the devil's beguiling offers, parrying each with robust and apt responses from Scripture. Jesus passed the test. In the original Greek, the word πειρασμός can be translated as 'temptation', but also as 'test' or 'trial', which is why these alternatives are seen in different versions of the Lord's Prayer. In Luke's Gospel, chapter 4, the 40-day period of trial for Jesus concludes with the menacing words: ¹³ καὶ συντελέσας πάντα πειρασμὸν ὁ διάβολος ἀπέστη ἀπ' αὐτοῦ ἄχρι καιροῦ (13 When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.) Jesus would be tested again, and again. Yet ever did he remain true to His Father in Heaven and to His calling to witness God's love on earth.

One would wish this kind of torturous moral testing upon no one, and we can be reassured by Paul's comforting words that '13 No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.' (1 Corinthians 10)

Jesus did come out of his 40 days of testing with a clearer confirmation of his purpose and mission. Returning to Galilee and hearing of his cousin John's arrest,



Jesus then Himself began to proclaim the Good News and urge all hearers to repent, for the Kingdom of God had come near!

A time of testing can bring greater clarity about one's true calling, what we need to say 'No' to and how we can say 'Yes' to God. Not for nothing did Paul also insist to Timothy that anyone interested in ministering in the Christian fellowship needed to be 'tested' (e.g. deacons, in 1 Timothy 3:10, though a different word for testing is used). Though such testing can be quite hard, it can ultimately prove helpful.

I was recently asked to speak to students at the international school in Groningen about twists and turns in my own career path. There have been many!
Fortunately, when I was younger, I was able safely to explore and pursue many different educational and vocational possibilities. I have no regrets, as I have learned a great deal, but I do, in retrospect, wonder if I might have come to my true calling sooner had I been tested

more. Perhaps the many fantasies and distractions I entertained about what I wanted to do or be might have rightly been sifted away sooner?


Ironically there are parallels between my own vocational exploration and that of the Samuel in the Bible (1 Samuel 3), insofar as he was called several times before he understood how, and only did finally recognize God was calling him with the help of wiser mentors. When he did receive his calling, though, it was not unchallenging! (As it should be!)

In my own pilgrimage, I do not have regrets about the twists and turns, for I have learned a lot and broadened my perspective, but I do think earlier and harder testing might have served me well.

All followers of Christ are called to serve in one way or another, and there is an immense variety of valuable ministries for Christians to rise to. I am both humbled and honored that, despite my own peripatetic journey, I may help our Diocesan team by advising those seeking to discern their own vocations. And so put some of my experiences (fortunate and less fortunate) to use.

How is God calling you? How can you test it to ensure you are going in the right direction? There are a number of helpful resources and people to look to help you on your own journey. The first place to start is prayer and reflection. Then asking those near and dear to you and also your local ministry team. The Vocations page of Church of England's website is also very helpful: https://www.churchofengland.org/life-events/vocations.

The Church Pastoral Aid Society (CPAS:



https://www.cpas.org.uk/) usefully sums up some key elements in discerning the direction of one's calling, under the fitting acronym 'C.O.M.P.A.S.S.'

Consistency Is this sense of calling something that is constant or recurring: a nagging sense that just won't go away over time? If so, then perhaps it is more than just an idea, a 'fad' or a phase you're going through. God won't give up on you just because you're confused or doubtful.

Others Is it through other people, maybe friends or colleagues, that you have received this call? Or have other people confirmed it? Can other people see the potential in you to fulfil this calling? What gifts do other people think you have? Often other people see us more objectively and honestly than we can see ourselves. It is worth talking to others who know you well, who will be honest with you and who you trust and respect. We are not called in isolation.

Motives Why are you thinking of pursuing this calling? Are your motives pure enough? Are you genuinely laying self-interest aside, and focused on core things that are important (not just money, lifestyle etc.)?

Passions What are the things that excite you and energise you? What turns

you on? You are unique. There is nobody else quite like you. Does what you are thinking about as a profession, a calling, strike a chord with you are and make you feel fulfilled as the person you were made to be?

Aptitudes What are you good at? What are your natural abilities? What are your gifts? Your God-given strengths? Your skills you have developed? Does the calling you're exploring fit with the tools already given you, or which are beginning to develop in you?

Spirituality How strong is your relationship with God, who can give you additional clues about your calling? Do you perceive God at work in the world and in your own life? How do you recognise the voice of God? Do you pray? Are you growing spiritually? And what will help you to help God help the world?

Sense Common sense, that is. When we're trying to discern our calling, we can't leave our brains at the door. What are the implications for you and for those around you? How does it fit with other callings you may already have to take seriously? Is the call realistic? With God all things are possible, but God also is a God of order, love and grace. God gives particular gifts and aptitudes to each of us. If a calling is

genuine and well-founded, at some point it will begin to make sense.

The above are things I wished I'd known sooner, but am grateful to share now.



MOTHERS' UNION AT UNCSW62

The 62nd United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW) takes place between March 12th and 23rd and for the second year running Mother's Union will be sending a delegation of members and staff to attend. The theme for this year is "facing the challenge of empowering rural women and girls". As an organisation with around 4 million members, many of whom are rural women themselves, our delegation is well placed to be able to contribute to the discussions representing our members worldwide. That is why we're sending a delegation of members and staff who will share their experience and unique knowledge with the forum.

The issues facing rural women are many and complex. As a member from South Africa wrote "poverty... bears the face of a woman" highlighting how the burden of poverty disproportionately falls on the rural poor, especially women. Mothers' Union have produced a statement for UNCSW based upon responses from over 250 members from around the world on the issue. Our findings proved that is that



issues such as isolation are universal across countries worldwide. However is emphasised that when rural women gain skills such as literacy and numeracy there are numerous positive outcomes including reductions in domestic abuse.

The UNCSW is an important opportunity for our members to discuss these issues with representatives from their governments. One of our delegates this year, Chipepa Leah Chipepa, told us how she plans "to engage with Zambia's Minister of Guidance and Religious Affairs using the outcomes document as the basis for discussion on how Mothers' Union can work with governments." Through these discussions we hope that more women and girls than ever before will be given access to infrastructure, education and be more widely represented politically.

This political participation is particularly important not only for women's futures but also for peace in general. Studies have

shown that peace agreements rarely even mention women, and even fewer have female negotiators and signatories. Despite this it has been shown that peace and reconciliation efforts that do provide for women, and involve them at the top level are far more likely to succeed. This is why we



feel that it is so important that Mothers'
Union are representing at UNCSW so their
voices can be heard.

Finally, although challenges exist for many rural women, rural communities can also be some of the most tight-knit, empowering and supportive and should be preserved when this is the case. The UNCSW will also discuss the problems facing all women, including those living in urban areas. Throughout the week we will share live updates on twitter – follow us @MothersUnion. I want to thank you and through you Holy Trinity Church for your unwavering and faithful suppoirt to the school feeding program. Our estimates are that it costs USD 5 to feed a child for a year, your donations last year helped to feed 220 children, who got breakfast every single day

they went to school. The donations from Holy Trinity
Church were a life line. Last year we spent less than previous years. This is because, as you may know, in 2017 there were presidential elections, the result was disputed by the opposition and the Supreme Court ordered a new election. This created a lot of uncertainty and tension and, given the deadly election violence that happened almost 10 years ago, the government decided to close

the schools early, in October, which meant that the feeding program ran for 3 months less that it normally does.

MY RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD


Written in response to an invitation in the #LiveLent 2018 app, where it said: "Make some time to write down the story of your relationship with God, how it began, how it has grown, what it means today"

Can we have a relationship with God? What would, or could, be the nature of that relationship? Is anything like an equal balance and mutual respect possible? When I read the invitation in the Live Lent app, I was immediately enthusiastic to reflect on my own relationship with God, which has not always been easy, but still fills me with gratitude, awe and love.

The first memory that now comes to mind, is of a teacher in preschool, who taught us the Lord's prayer. She said that we should close our eyes, because then we would see God. I tried that out, but it didn't seem to

work. This was disappointing, and puzzled me. Yet her remark stayed with me, as a treasured memory of someone who showed me what might be possible.

Later on, I learned more things about God in school and Church. I must have been a strange kid, for I had the habit of actually believing what was told and then acting accordingly. For example when I heard about David and Goliath: the next time I encountered a bully, I told him that I trusted God and therefore he would not be able to hurt me. In response, he kicked me extra hard. What I learned thereafter is

that most adults are not able or willing to explain these differences between theory and practice. Basically, they seemed to think that I had been rather silly to actually believe what I had been told, and that was that.

Then I began to be puzzled about God's omnipotence. I wondered how he controls everything I do, even my decisions. Once, cycling back from school, I wanted to explore this by experiment. I figured that I might detect God influencing my will if I could manage to stop willing something consciously. So I tried to cycle as

unconsciously as possible. This proved rather difficult - I fell in the attempt - and the whole experiment was a failure because I had still been slightly consciously aware that it was my own decision to stop pedalling. These experiments may seem extraordinarily silly and impractical, but I enjoyed them as a way of exploring something that is highly intangible, but real.

Thus I had three questions: can we see God; can we trust God; can we be autonomous in our relationship with God. And these seem to define my struggles in coming to grips with this bizarre relationship that we might have with this being who is different from us in almost all respects, although he says we have been made in his image.

I don't think these questions ever really left me, but for a long time they had been lingering somewhere in the back of my mind, whilst I was busy studying, working, marrying and raising children. But now in the past three years they have come back in full force. I had a lot of serious doubts,

shattered illusions and fears that God might be shutting me out. Looking back, I think I was most of all haunted by my own inner critic, constantly questioning my own motives. This went with panic attacks and long periods without sleep. During the last such episode, I sought rest by going for a walk, and ended up in a church. Many things were special in that walk, and the things that God seemed to be telling me, but one thing really was a turning point: a few days later, when I had finally had some sleep, and came back to my senses, it was as if God told me: "See: you really love me, otherwise you would not have gone to a church in such a state!". This argument convinced me, and helped me shut up that inner critic. It seems to me that this personal way of dealing with people is typical for God, and shows his respect for my autonomous choice and personality.

I know that he created me, and gave that love in my heart as a gift. But it feels very much as if God considered it really important to create the space and opportunity for me to make an autonomous choice to use that gift and love him back.



These readings are from The Revised Tables of Lessons 1922

This pattern of readings is taken from the Book of Common Prayer (revised 1922). It leads us each year through most of the Old Testament once and the whole New Testament twice. The readings are longer than you might be used to, but just let them wash over you and shape your soul like a rock in a river that is gradually shaped by the current. If you miss a bit, just pick up on the present day's readings when you return. Or if it is too much, chose just the Old Testament or Gospel or Epistle readings. Grey highlighted boxes are special readings related to a day of Fasting or a Feast day, which we begin to celebrate the night before.
